Why this resource?

<u>The risks to Australia of a 3 degrees Celsius warmer world</u> is a resource intended to support student discussions about climate change. It provides students opportunities to consider how science and scientific thinking impact our everyday lives.

It encourages students to:

- Be curious
- Collaborate
- Develop and use critical thinking skills
- Practise communication skills

Why use thinking routines?

To facilitate student discussion, this resource uses a specific thinking routine. A thinking routine is a set of questions or steps used to scaffold and support students to organise their ideas, reason carefully, and reflect on their thinking. The routines can be used in a range of contexts. If you are new to thinking routines or would like to explore further, check out Project Zero's <u>Thinking Routine Toolbox</u>.





Why this thinking routine?

Connect, Extend, Challenge*

This thinking routine helps students connect new ideas raised in the video to existing and familiar ideas. It encourages students to reflect on how the video content extends and challenges their thinking.

How might you use this resource?

<u>The risks to Australia of a 3 degrees Celsius warmer world</u> can be used by students individually or in groups. Recording group responses can be collated and used to stimulate deeper discussion or re-visited later.

Having discussed the content and engaged with the routine, you may invite students to consider how science and technology help us to understand the causes and monitor the impacts of increasing temperatures on ecosystems.

Your context, your judgement

We suggest you watch the video in advance and consider your students' experience so that you can anticipate questions or concerns they may have.
